#### **Excellence Beyond Breeding, Training and Performing**

Part II by Alice Musburger

I last wrote part I of this article for the July 2020 Vox. I apologize for the gap in time before continuing on with what I have learned. You may refer to the July Vox on the TCVESSA website if you wish to read the entire content.

To review Part I in summary is as follows:

- The disciplines of canine sports medicine, orthopedics and physiotherapy are rapidly growing from injury or post-surgery rehab to conditioning, warmups, cooldowns and injury prevention in most all competitive dog venues.
- There is much science-based research on the importance of proper warm up and cool down routines for our dogs and the correct methods for the various competition venues.
- There is a huge difference between conditioning exercises, warm up exercises and cool down exercises.
- Conditioning is designed to stress or fatigue a muscle or muscle group in order to make them stronger.
- Warmups are intended to prepare your dog for any activity that involves an increase in resting heart rate and physical exertion of some type that mimics the competition work.
- Cool downs should be done right away after the activity is completed. Never put your dog away without a cool down.
- Most exercises fall into two very different categories. These categories are static and dynamic exercises.

#### Part II By Alice Musburger

Static exercises, more commonly called stretches, are passive stretches and are held BY THE HANDLER FOR the dog. They are completed slowly, with no active movement by the dog and are held for a set period of time. Static stretches should never be done on cold muscles. This could cause damage. Research has also shown that there are negative effects up to 24 hours following static stretching prior to any performance event. Also, static stretching in a warmup does not reduce overall injury rates. As a matter of fact, static stretching between repeated sessions of exercise have been shown to result in slower times.

Proper warm-up exercises are intended to prepare the dog's body for the upcoming work. It is intended to gradually help increase the blood flow to the working muscles and to elevate muscle temperature. It is important to warm up for 5-10 minutes ahead of the activity. The first 2-3 minutes should be using the dog's whole body and focus on the large muscle groups. Once the body temperature is elevated then sport specific dynamic stretches can be used.

Large muscle exercises would include things like fast walking, easy trotting, circles and spins of 360 degrees and perhaps walking backwards. It is a good plan to walk with your dog at your side in small circles first and then gradually make the circles larger. Do this on both sides of your body. After the dog is warmed up then dynamic stretches that focus on different smaller muscle groups can begin.

#### **Examples of dynamic stretches are:**

**PLAY BOW:** Make sure the dog's elbows touch the ground and the stifles are in straight. Hold the stretch for five seconds and then slowly release. Repeat 3-5 times.

**STRETCHING FOR TREATS:** Keep your dog's nose level and lure the nose to shoulder, next lure the nose to the hip and then the nose to the hock. Hold stretch for 3-5 seconds. Some dogs may be more flexible on one side of their body over the other side.

**HIGH FIVE:** With the dog in a tuck-sit, ask for a handshake and gradually increase the height of your hand to a "High-Five" position. Repeat each paw five times.

**HIP FLEXOR STRETCHES:** Use a low stool, then a chair and then perhaps yourself to stretch the dog using treats as a lure.

**STAND TO DOWN:** Begin with the dog is a square stand. Lure his nose with treats down and in between his legs toward his elbows and chest to a down. This is a fold down to the sphinx position.

**SIT TO STAND:** From a tuck-sit, ask your dog to kick-back their hind feet to a stand. You may assist them with light pressure under their tummy until they learn to "kick" back.

**POP-UPS:** With your dog at heel in a tuck-sit, ask them to lift their front feet up into the air. Gradually teach your dog reach higher and higher and eventually jump straight up to get the treat.

**PIVOTS ON A PERCH:** With the dog's front feet on a low perch, lure the dog's nose to the side so that the dog crosses his hind legs to circle the perch.

**CROSSING THE FRONT FEET:** With your dog standing at your side, lean into his ribs and lure his nose in the same direction so that he crosses his front legs.

**WEAVE BETWEEN YOUR LEGS:** Have your dog weave figure eights in both directions between your legs.




Figure 13: Figure 8 between legs

The sky is the limit when discovering dynamic exercises. For example, if your dog knows how to do the "high-five", perhaps you could teach him to reach his hind foot back to a target to stretch his hind legs. This is much better than you manually stretching his hind leg.

### Excellence Beyond Breeding, Training and Performing (Continued)

Remember, the idea is to warm up your dog's muscles and circulatory system prior to exerting. This is not limited to performance events. You should warm up your dog before playing fetch, swimming or any activity you ask your dog to try. Even conformation should be considered an event. Long hours on the table or in a crate will not yield a dog that can move to his best ability in the show ring.

Try to match your warm-ups and routine to the activity your dog is to perform. Agility requires a lot so having your dog "wrap" a cone, one jump wing or a trash can in addition to using a practice jump is important. It is equally important to warm-up before rally and obedience. Not only are the dog's muscle fibers and joints warmed up, mental focus and your connection to your dog are improved. A warm muscle allows the muscle fibers to glide more easily and helps the nerve impulse travel faster. A warm-up helps you detect if something is "off" with your dog and can help you prevent further injury.

Lastly, develop a fun warm-up routine with your dog so that you can both move through it easily. If your dog is required to perform multiple times in a day, you need to plan on warming your dog up EACH and EVERY time he is to perform. If you have a routine, things will go smoothly.

#### TCVESSA VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES

- 1. Club Silent Auction Coordinator: The club generally offers a few larger items that have either been donated or purchased. This person would determine the items to be offered, propose a budget to the board, obtain the items, advertise them prior to the Specialty, and run the event (usually just on the Saturday of the Specialty Weekend).
- 2. Rescue Raffle: The club has frequently supported the running of a Rescue Raffle although Rescue it is a separate entity. This person would solicit items for a prize drawing from club members, gather them prior or at the show, advertise the prize drawing, set up the display, sell tickets, and forward proceeds to the Minnesota Rescue Organization.
- 3. Ribbon Chair Person: This person would inventory the Ribbons/Rosettes we currently have, work with the Ribbon/Rosette supplier (TBD, we might have the superintendent provide them) to order the necessary Rosettes/Ribbons depending on the class entries, attach date tags on those Rosettes required by AKC, and set up and clear off the Rosette/Ribbon table each day and box up remaining inventory at the end of the show.
- 4. Lunch Order Management: This person would take the lunch orders that are sent in (we generally have the lunch orders sent with the grooming/electrical orders) from the grooming chair, organize a daily sheet of orders, place the lunch orders, and then monitor pick up. Similar to morning hospitality, we will need to work through how this will be managed with any COVID restrictions.



#### TCVESSA BOARD MEETING MINUTES ~ October 4, 2020

Courtney Hansen called the meeting to order at 1:34 p.m. The outdoor fall general membership meeting was held at the home of Kathy Patregnani. COVID-19 Social distancing practices were in effect.

Board members present: President, Courtney Hansen, Secretary, Alice Musburger and board members at large, Diane Slias, Carmen Laing and Kathy Patregnani. Absent board members were Vice President Liz Pike, Tekla Viker, Julie Roberts and B.A. Breese. VOX editor Joan Beck was present.

Working spots will cost \$125 per day or \$200 for both days. Audit Spots will cost \$60 per day or \$100 for both days. Club members will be given priority until October 15. The contact person is Courtney Hansen.

The 2021 National Specialty is to be in Michigan in May. However, Michigan law under Covid-19 only allows for 50 people in a building at once. Therefore, it appears that the National will probably not be held. If the National is cancelled, our club may then look into holding our Specialty as usual.

Carmen Laing volunteered to reserve Club 42 in New Hope for the club's annual awards banquet in March 2021.

#### **New Business:**

Kathy made a motion to notify all club members of our upcoming board meetings and to include them in the Zoom invitation. Board business would be conducted after everyone else signs off. Carol Hitz seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Ideas for club activities were mentioned. They were a fun and games day, have another grooming clinic, reserve a pool day at the Paw in Mankato and check interest on a tracking seminar. Joan Beck agreed to check on the use of the Paw this coming winter.






